



Did you know?

Your baby is starting to learn social skills that will last a lifetime.
Baby can take turns with you — looking, smiling and cooing at a familiar face.
Baby’s brain is building connections when experiencing new things.
At 3–4 months, your baby may turn to look for the source of a noise like a rattle.
Babies learn best when their basic needs are met and they feel secure.
These early months and years are essential for your baby’s learning.

What can you do now?

- Share looks and smiles. Find moments to listen and respond to your baby.
- Watch baby communicate through movements, sounds and faces.
- Speak to your baby in your home language. When baby babbles, talk back.
- Sing, read and tell familiar and fun stories.
- Give baby new words, sounds and experiences.
- Help your baby touch and taste toys and books.
